

Holy Family Pupil Premium Report 2019-2020

Background

The Pupil Premium is a grant allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. This also includes pupils eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (known as the Ever 6 FSM measure). This year, 17 children have been eligible for the Pupil Premium funding grant.

Pupil Premium Allocation 2019-2020

During this academic year, we used the grant of £23,470 as follows:

Spending analysis:

Teaching and Learning (inc. resources) – 70%

Emotional/Mental health support – 20%

Training – 6%

Opportunities and Welfare – 4%

It is important to note that this year's data comes from the assessment period Autumn 1 to Spring 2. There was no assessment data from Spring 2 to Summer 2 due to school closure for Covid-19. Pupil attainment, therefore reflects only one and half terms of learning instead of 3 full terms and is not reflective of a whole year of achievement. This year the impact report is not only data driven but also takes in to consideration the success in getting pupil premium children back in to school wherever possible.
