




People could become slaves as a punishment for a crime, being captured during a war, to pay back a debt or even born into slavery.

A servant is paid to do work for another person. They might be paid a wage, or be paid in something else of value. Servants could resign from their job, unlike slaves who could only leave if they were freed by their owner.



The servant girls in the story thought they were better than Rhodopis because she was 'only a slave'.

Rhodopis couldn't have retaliated to their taunts as she had very little power, and would probably be punished if she didn't do as she was told.




