## Church

A special place of worship for many Christians. There are different types of churches and different branches of Christianity.

## Stained-glass windows

Some churches have colourful stained-glass windows. They often show stories from the Bible and Christian Saints.

## Bible

A special holy book for Christians. It is divided into the Old and New Testaments. The story of Jesus is in the New Testament.

## Altar

It is a large table in the front of the church. It is a holy table and you will usually see the cross in between the altar candles.

## Stoup

This is a small basin which contains holy water. It is near the entrance of the church door. You dip your fingers in the water and make the sign of the cross on yourself.

## Font

This is a large basin containing holy water. One use of the baptismal font is to christen or baptise babies to welcome them into the Christian faith.

## The Cross

The cross is a symbol for Christians because Jesus died on the cross. It shows the love God has for us that He sent his only Son to die for us so that we may be saved.

## The Crucifix

This is a cross with Jesus on. It is a Catholic Crucifix. It shows the love God has for us that He sent his only Son to die for us so that we may be saved.

## Rosary

The Rosary is made up of a string of beads which are used for prayers. One large bead followed by a group of ten is called a decade known as Hail Marys.


## Pews

These are seats that are wooden benches and are usually arranged in a row. It is where people sit and listen to the preacher.

## Pulpit

This is where the preacher stands and preaches to the congregation about the Holy Bible.


## Hassock or Kneeler

This is a thick cushion found on pews. It is used to kneel on when praying.

## Chalice

A chalice is a large goblet. It contains wine or grape juice which symbolises the blood of Christ.

## Ciborium

It looks like a chalice except that it has a lid. Inside is the bread which has been blessed. The bread symbolises the body of Christ.

## The Eucharist

It is also known as Holy Communion or the Lord's Supper. It takes place during Christian worship in which there is breaking of bread which symbolises the body of Jesus, and a sip of wine from a chalice which symbolises the blood of Jesus.


## Votive candles

A votive or prayer candle is a small candle. It is burnt when someone is saying a prayer for him or herself or for someone else.

## Candle

The lighted candle reminds Christians that Jesus is the light of the world. He brings peace and hope to all.

## Church Collection

Sometimes a plate or bag is passed round the congregation for them to put money in. In some churches you can use a debit or credit card.

## Hymn book

This book contains Christian hymns to sing to praise God. There are hymns for Christmas, Easter, harvest and other special events.

## Hymn board

This board shows the number of the hymn to sing in the hymn book. For example, hymn number 282 could be All Things Bright And Beautiful.

## Tabernacle

The consecrated Eucharist is stored inside a locked box. The Eucharist means the same as communion or the Lord's Supper. The Eucharist is the bread and the wine.


## Aspergillum and Sprinkler

The bowl contains holy water. The brush is dipped into the water and shaken. Sometimes a silver ball on a stick is used to sprinkle the holy water.

## Handbells

Handbells are part of the church's ceremonies. Individual handbells can be pitched to the same key on a piano. You will often hear a bell choir at Christmas time.

## Bell Tower or Belfry

 Inside the belfry are one or more bells. The bells are chimed to let people know that it is time for worship. The bells are also rung for ceremonies such as weddings.
## Church Spire

On top of the church tower is the spire.

## Graveyard

A graveyard contains Christian burials. Some graves are plain-looking and others are decorated. Some churches also erect memorials for the war dead.

## Organ

This musical instrument is played when the congregation sing hymns and Christmas carols. It sounds different from a piano.


## Piano

This musical instrument is played during hymn singing. It has a different sound from the organ.

## Aisle

Depending on how big a church is, the aisle is a corridor on either side of a nave which is a large central aisle. Aisles are divided from a nave by colonnades or pillars and has a separate roof.

## Nave

When you enter the main entrance of a church, which is usually the west end, you will see a large central aisle. In front of you is the altar. In some churches the nave ends where there is an arch. Sometimes there is a lectern or pulpit.

## Eagle Lectern

Some lecterns are in the shape of an eagle. The Bible rests on the wings. One meaning of the eagle is that it carries the message of God to the four corners of the world.

## Lectern

A stand which supports the Bible from which the preacher reads. You will sometimes see a lectern with an eagle's head.

## Thurible

It is a metal censer hanging from a chain. It is swung during worship. The incense inside gives off a pleasant aroma.

## Confessional box

This looks like a cupboard with doors or curtains on either side. This is where a Catholic person goes to confess their sins to the priest.

## ICHTHUS

In the early days of Christianity the fish was a secret symbol for Christians. In Greek 'Ichthus' means fish and the letters stand for 'Jesus Christ, God's Son, Saviour'.

## Paten

The paten is a shallow gold or silver plate that is used to hold the bread that has been blessed. The bread symbolises the body of Christ.

## Cruet

This is the vessel that holds the wine or water for the Eucharist or Holy Communion.

## Teacher's Notes

This product relates to the church and its features. There are two sets of word wall cards with description about the object. The cards can also be used as flash cards.

## Content:

1. $2 x$ sets of 35 word wall cards which you can laminate for durability and display on your classroom wall. They can also be used as flash cards to increase students' vocabulary.
2. $2 x$ Write the room activity worksheets and corresponding number tiles. The church objects on the worksheets are numbered 1 to 8.

Preparation: You will need 8 of the word wall cards to place around the classroom. Ensure the numbers on the cards match the numbered pictures on the worksheets.

There are number tiles 1 to 8 which you can laminate.
3. $2 \times$ Match and Stick Activity Sheets - There are 8 pictures and words to match up and stick on the worksheets provided. There are extra word tiles for bread - unleavened bread, wafer and host.

Use blu tack/double-side tape and place the numbers on the word card.

Students move around the classroom with their worksheet and match the number on their worksheet to the number on the word wall card. So, next to number 5 , the student will write 'Pews' on their worksheet.

There are extra number tiles 9 to 12.
As an separate activity (without the worksheets) - Put numbers on the word cards you want students to list and they can write the words in their workbooks.
4. Tick and sort extra worksheet activity with extension for more able students.

There are 8 pictures of which 4 of the pictures relate to Christianity. Students tick and colour the pictures that relate to Christianity.

## For extension:

The pictures that do not belong to Christianity, students could say or write what religion they pictures relate to. (Answer Sheet included)
