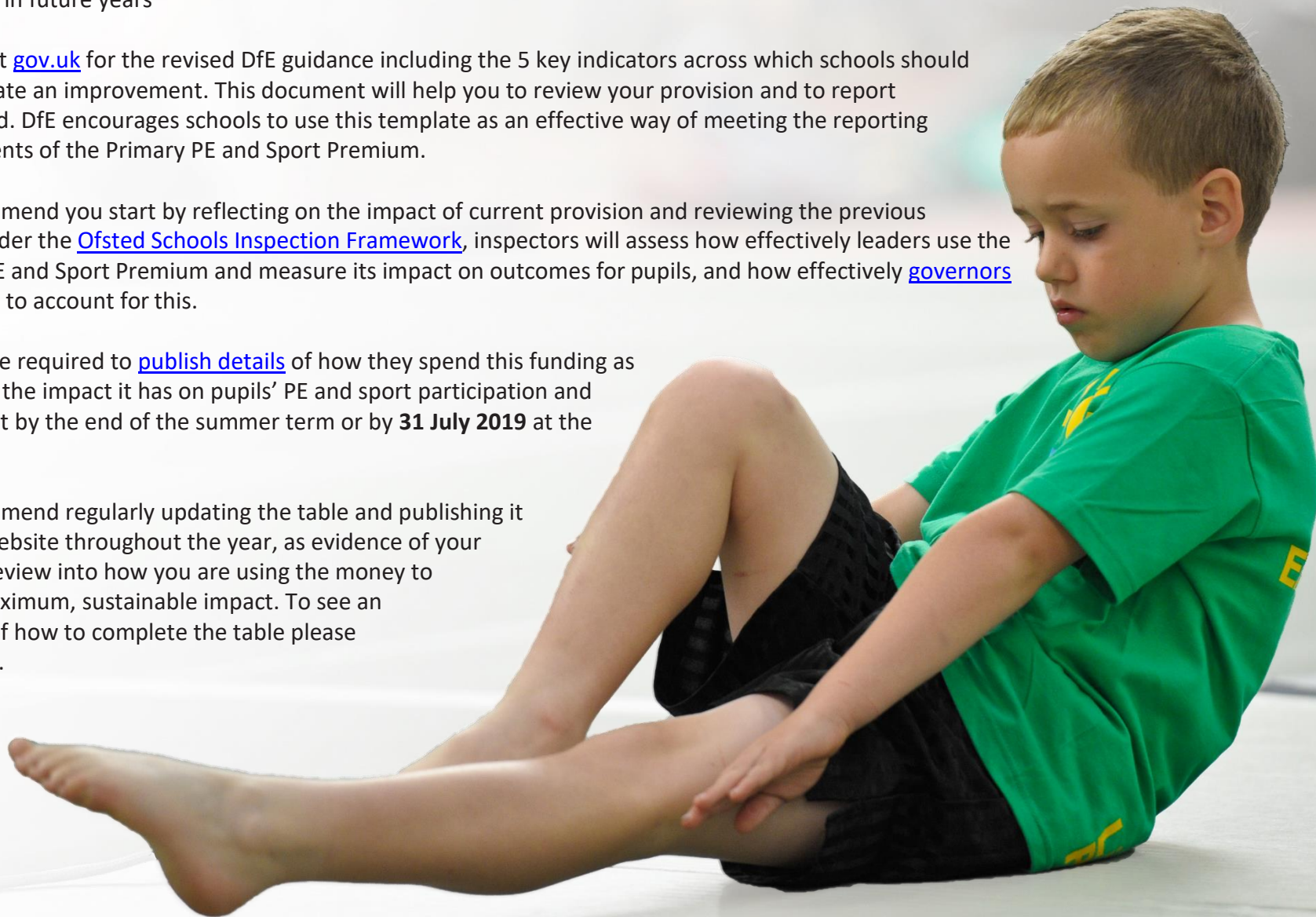
- Develop or add to the PESPA activities that your school already offer

Under the [Ofsted Schools Inspection Framework](#), inspectors will assess how effectively leaders use the Primary PE and Sport Premium and measure its impact on outcomes for pupils, and how effectively [governors](#) hold them to account for this.
